Claymont Elementary Parent Information Reminders

Dear Parents:

We are approaching the end of the school year and want to make sure we keep our kids on the right track. You can help at home by encouraging your child to make good decisions and exhibit positive behaviors in line with our school programs.

Please see the enclosed information as it pertains to our Leader in Me, PBIS (State Required Program) and our C.A.R.E. Matrix.

The Leader in Me is a program that promotes developing leadership skills in all of us. The program focuses on the 8 Habits: Be Proactive, Begin With the End in Mind, Put First Things First, Think Win-Win, Seek First to Understand, Then Be Understood, Synergize, Sharpen the Saw, and last but not least, Find Your Voice.

The students have a workbook that they work out of daily which includes a monthly worksheet that they may take home and complete with you or a family member. The worksheet is called **Home Connection**.

This program is linked to our district-wide C.A.R.E. Matrix (enclosed).

We also have a state mandated program that all schools in Ohio must implement. It is PBIS (Positive Behavior Intervention Supports). The program involves 3 Tiers: Tier I is designed for all students, Tier II is designed for those with minor behaviors and Tier III is designed for those with repeated behaviors. We use this program for positive referrals for students who are exhibiting good behaviors and negative referrals to help students who may be struggling with making good choices. In Tier II and III we take a specific issue and work with that student to discuss ways he/she could handle certain situations in a different, more positive way. Sometimes an outside source may be used to address a social or emotional issue.

The PBIS program leads into our "Lunch Bunch" that meets once a month to have lunch with me. All staff members have the opportunity to submit the names of students who have exhibited positive behaviors. The day prior to the luncheon, names are drawn for that lunch.


We also have Gold Tickets (Catchem' Being Good) that students can earn. They may be given a yellow ticket for following the 8 habits and the C.A.R.E. Matrix throughout the day. An example may be walking quietly in the hall (See Matrix). The tickets are given out by the entire staff and collected in a container outside the main office. Once a month names are drawn and prizes are given. Again, this is a way we are promoting and rewarding positive behavior in the building.

Each month, teachers choose a Student of the Month in each classroom. This is another way we promote our Leader In Me and PBIS. The student must demonstrate the 8 Habits and C.A.R.E Matrix in the classroom as well as outside the classroom and be considered a role model to their peers.

I am attaching samples of the 8 Habits, Leader In Me, PBIS and our district wide C.A.R.E. Matrix for you to review to have a better understanding of our school programs.



Parents as Partners

As a *Leader in Me* School, one of our 5 Core Paradigms is that parents and teachers partner to support the whole child. What this means is that we value you as your student's first teacher. You know your student best. Oftentimes it's easy to assume that teachers are the only ones who are responsible for a student's academic and social success in school. As a parent of a *Leader in Me* student, we believe that you are a valuable member of our Learning Team. You have an important role in the educational journey of your student. Research shows that when parents are engaged in their student's education, the student's success, academically and behaviorally, increases significantly. If we know this partnership is critical, what can we do to create a partnership?

We would love to get your insights and feedback on what we can do to nurture this partnership as well as your ideas on what you would like to do as a partner in your student's education.

Following are a few of our insights on working together to create a partnership:

Partnering is about communication and relationships. We want to honor your family's culture, beliefs, and circumstances. We want to communicate with you about what is happening in school, but that's only one part of effective communication. We encourage you to share your opinions, ideas, and background. We believe all of us have unique gifts and talents. If you are doing something at home that works well for your student, that you are proud of, or simply a fun fact about your family, share it with us. Your input and voice is so important!

A partnership is not only about being physically present at the school, volunteering, or being on committees—that is only one aspect of partnership. If you're working full time, travel for work, or simply cannot be physically present to engage that doesn't mean you're not our partner. There are other ways to engage such as:

- · Add our school to your social media feed.
- Set up regular times to check in with your student about what they enjoy at school or what is a challenge.
- Regularly check emails or other communications from your student's teachers and respond. Ask questions when clarification is needed.
- Model a positive attitude about school.

Let's keep the communication lines open! We may have questions or concerns. Let's create space to ask questions and listen to each other. We want to be there for you! Just like you, we can't do this alone. We must come together as a Learning Team to support your student and ensure they have every opportunity for success.

Leadership Roles at Home

Each new school year brings opportunities for academic growth and growth in all areas of development. Although students must be knowledgeable when they graduate, they must also be healthy, engaged, responsible, and caring people.

One of the best ways to help your student realize their worth and leadership potential is to provide an opportunity to lead. Most *Leader in Me* Schools offer student leadership roles as a way to teach:

- Responsibility
- Leadership
- Contribution

Leadership roles can also be used at home. To begin:

- 1. Talk with your student about the leadership role he or she might be interested in at home.
- Discuss why they are interested in the role. Ask what leadership qualities your student has that will help. Ask how he or she will handle homework or other commitments with this new role responsibility.
- 3. With your student, discuss leadership behaviors and expectations of the role.

Some examples of at-home leadership roles include:

- Gardener: watering and maintaining indoor/outdoor plants
- Technology lead: ensuring all devices are charged and in order
- Floor Leader: ensuring the floors are clean and free of clutter
- · Assistant Chef: providing support in the kitchen as needed

Give your student a week or so to adjust and then discuss how it's going. This may open a conversation about how to handle things that are too easy or too difficult. Express appreciation and celebrate success!





Raising hard working, empathetic, respectful children is our goal as a school and community. At school we are focusing on 7 Habits that help instill these qualities into our kids. Students are rewarded for demonstrating these 7 habits at school with Fun Fridays, special shout outs, lunch with the principal, and lots of praise and encouragement. We want you, the caretakers, to join in on our efforts to promote the 7 Habits! If you catch your child following the habit listed below, please take a picture of him or her in action with a description of how they are following the habit at home and send it via DOJO or email to your child's teacher. These pictures will be printed off and hung in the hallway at school to show students that we are a united team that cares about their emotional development and encourages reputable behavior.



Seek First to Understand, Then to Be Understood: I listen to other people's ideas and feelings I try to see things from their viewpoints I listen to others without interrupting I am confident in voicing my ideas I look people in the eyes when talking.

- 1) Practice reflective listening. Say something to your kids and then have them repeat back what you said. Do this until you feel like everyone in the family listens without thinking of a response simultaneously.
- 2) Conflict Resolution: The next time there is a problem within the family have the involved parties sit down and listen to the other person's point of view. They have to be able to restate the other person's feelings before they can state theirs or respond to what was said. ("So what I heard you say was...")
- 3) Take family time to learn about other cultures.
