TREASURER'S MESSAGE

In order for Claymont City Schools to accomplish their vision of providing each student an opportunity for a lifetime of success, maintaining financial stability is crucial. As stewards of public money, it is imperative that the district's financial records are complete, accurate, timely and reliable. The Treasurer's Office is responsible for all accounting, payroll and financial reporting for the district including: payroll and benefits, accounts payable and receivable, and EMIS (student information) data coordination. The Treasurer must hold an appropriate certification to serve as the Chief Financial Officer and reports directly to the Board of Education.Many of the duties and responsibilities of the Treasurer are outlined in various sections of the Ohio Revised Code.

Each year, the Ohio Auditor of State's Office or a designee accounting firm conducts an audit of Claymont's financials. The auditors review a wide variety of records for accuracy and compliance, including but not limited to bank reconciliations, employee earnings, purchases, public records requests, student attendance, and documented policies. The district strives for excellence and it has been shown by receiving the Auditor of State Award.

Claymont City Schools is funded mainly by three sources: State Foundation, Property Taxes, and Public Utility Taxes. This year, the district received 69.78% of their revenue from the State. Claymont also receives federal funds through Title grants. In order for Claymont to create an environment that nurtures, develops and empowers each student, focus must be given to preserve, expand and improve our buildings, classrooms and curriculum. Funds received from the one-time allocations of the Elementary and Secondary School Relief Funds (ESSER), which were awarded in 2020 and 2021, helped with some of these purchases, i.e., new boilers and chillers in each building, new curriculum which included electronic components, technology and building repairs.

Responsible stewardship allows for increased student opportunities today while maintaining stability for a better tomorrow. Financial updates are given each month at the board of education meeting, as well as a five-year forecast updated each November and May. CURRICULUM

CLAYMONT USES ESSER FUNDS TO UPDATE CURRICULUM

Claymont has updated the curriculum for the core subject areas within the last three years thanks to the ESSER funds received following the COVID-19 pandemic. Teachers and administrators worked collaboratively to review the available curriculum products and chose the programs that met the criteria for high quality instructional materials through EdReports and best fit the needs of the district.


The ELA curriculum team selected Wonders, a McGraw-Hill product, for our core curriculum at the K-5 grade levels and Studysync, also a McGraw-Hill product, for our upper grades. In addition to these core products, we've added Fundations as a supplemental program for grades K-3 to strengthen our students' foundational reading skills. Fundations is a research-based program that has developed a carefully structured reading, spelling, and handwriting curriculum using engaging, multisensory techniques aligned with the science of reading.

The Math curriculum team selected Reveal Math for all students starting at Kindergarten and extending through grade 12. As with our ELA selection, EdReports has awarded Reveal Math green ratings across all three gateways: Focus and Coherence, Rigor and Mathematical Practices and Usability. To support the students that struggle with the core Math curriculum, the district also purchased the supplemental intervention programs Redbird (grades K-3) and ALEKS (grades 4-12).

Our science curriculum team elected to keep Interactive Science as our core science program for grades 3 - 8, the high school science curriculum are as follows: Dimensions for Physical Science, World of Chemistry for chemistry and Miller Levine Biology for biology. In addition to the core curriculum materials, the district purchased Gismos for both our math and science teachers. Gizmos are interactive math and science labs and simulations for grades 3-12. They were purchased to give students more opportunity to experiment, manipulate, question, see results, and draw conclusions on a variety of new topics.

The most recent curriculum purchase was for Social Studies for several grade levels, and Science in our younger grades. The social studies curriculum team selected Studies Weekly for the K-3 social studies curriculum and K-2 science curriculum. Studies Weekly is a student-friendly periodical format that is aligned to state standards, consumable and hands-on and is organized through themes so that the content can be easily integrated into a Language Arts block. Our grade 6-8 teachers selected the social studies curriculum published by Savvas and no changes were made with our grade 4-5 or high school social studies curriculum.

When all purchases were made, the district spent over \$1.1 million dollars to update our instructional materials, meet the instructional needs of our students and ensure our students have access to high quality curriculum and supplemental materials. The curriculum updates were desperately needed for several years, but were not possible due to budget constraints. Although the pandemic was a difficult time for all, the district is fortunate to have received ESSER funds to be able to purchase new, high quality curriculum with digital access for remote instruction that includes engaging instructional materials to educate and motivate our students for years to come.

Claymont City School District and Aultman Health Foundation awarded a \$1,896,633 million dollar grant to open a school-based health center.

Claymont City School District and Aultman Health Foundation will partner to open a new school-based health center thanks to a \$1.896,633 million dollar Appalachian Community Grant Program grant as part of Ohio Gov. Mike DeWine's ongoing investment in Ohio's Appalachian communities.



Claymont City School District will construct a 2,000-square-foot school-based health center on the grounds of Claymont High School, which will allow Aultman to provide enhanced acute care and comprehensive well-care to address absenteeism among students and staff. Primary care offerings will be comprehensive, including but not limited to well visits, acute and sick visits, vaccinations, and more. Patients can be seen for anything from routine annual care to chronic disease management for conditions such as asthma or diabetes as well as primary care mental health. Point-of-care testing will also be available to enable immediate diagnostic testing and treatment for students, staff, and the broader community. The health center will be staffed by a nurse practitioner and a medical assistant and is planning to operate weekdays, year-round. In addition, The Village Network, a community-based mental health provider, plans to open a secondary location inside the center to provide support to students and the community.

Schools can play a critical role in improving a child's health and well-being. More than 150 traditional school-based health center sites operate or are under development in Ohio, according to the Ohio School-Based Health Alliance. This project will open 16 new school-based health centers, along with mobile care services, behavioral health services, dental services and mobile vision services. A completion date for the clinic has been set for the Fall of 2025.

THE HIGH SCHOOL IS GOING SOLAR

With an expected completion date of November 2024, the high school will be supplementing their power usage with solar. TMI Energy Solutions won the bid for the work. This is a 25 year lease that will save the district approximately one million dollars over the 25 years. The maintenance and upkeep will be done by the supplier. This will be installed in the field to the right of the school.

COLLEGE CREDIT PLUS AND CAREER TECH CREDENTIALS

Claymont School District is proud to offer a variety of College Credit Plus Options and Career Tech Credentials for our students.

The University of Akron provides eight virtual courses for students that are guaranteed to transfer and apply toward related general education subject areas at any of Ohio's public colleges or universities.

Stark State College, students have the opportunity to earn an Associate's Degree by taking online courses which are facilitated by a Claymont teacher or enroll in one of the following career tech

- programs that lead to a 12-point career tech credential:
 - 1. Administrative Office Professional
 - 2. Emergency Fire Services,
 - 3. Emergency Medical Services Technician,
 - 4. Medical Billing Specialist Certification
 - 5. Phlebotomy Certification.

Although not offered onsite, Kent State Tuscarawas campus is just a short drive north for those students seeking a more traditional college setting.

CAREER TECHNICAL PATHWAYS

Our District also houses five career-technical education programs :

- 1. Agriculture,
- 2. Interactive Media
- 3. Engineering
- 4. Manufacturing
- 5. Business

Each offers high-quality educational experiences to help prepare students for a career upon graduation. Students acquire real-world skills through classroom learning, hands-on labs, student organizations and work-based learning with local businesses.

NEW LOOK FOR K-2 REPORT CARDS


Over the last few years, Claymont has made significant changes to our Kindergarten – Second grade report cards. Rather than using A-F grades, parents will see their child's progress reported with a 0-4 rating scale on priority grade level standards. Teachers have developed scoring rubrics to help parents understand how a specific score was achieved and also what skills are needed to improve the score for the next grading period. An important thing to note is that a score of "3" is proficient. If a child receives a "4" on a standard, it means they are performing above grade level. Parents can view the rubrics for each standard on the District website.

AFTER-SCHOOL STEAM PROGRAMS

This year, our district received additional Title V funding that allowed us to offer extra-curricular STEAM opportunities for our Middle and High School students.

1) The VEX Robotics program was an extension of our PLTW program at Claymont High School.Students learned how to build and program robotic systems.

Beyond science and engineering principles, VEX encouraged creativity, teamwork, leadership and problem solving. All skills highly sought by future employers.





2) Poet's Pals was organized to give more students the opportunity to be a part of the student handler group for Poet, the school's facility dog. Students learned about the purpose and need for the Facility Dog program. They worked with the dog to perform basic commands that could be used in the classroom to support students. Students also learned how to care for and groom the dog and recognize communication clues from the dog that indicate stress or other needs. In addition to working directly with the facility dog, the students created "Poet Pick-Me-Up" cards to send to individuals throughout the year (mouth-delivered by Poet and the student handlers), developed the "calming pups" program, which will be used as an outreach in the community. Calming pups are stuffed animals that will be available to give to a student experiencing a crisis or overwhelming situation. Finally, the students made homemade dog treats. This program taught students empathy and compassion, fostered responsibility and developed leadership skills for those participating while also exploring career opportunities with animals.

3) The "Beat Winter Boredom with Arts and Crafts" program was designed to complement the general art curriculum and provide an outlet for students during the cold, dreary winter months.Students explored different mediums and made connections to different cultures, science, and literature through various art projects.





4) Planet Pollution Patrol allowed the students to conduct research and participate in hands-on activities to understand the different types of pollution and learn how pollution affects humans and the environment. As a culminating activity, students were tasked with determining a solution to limit pollution in their school and community based on their research and discoveries in the activities. As a way to reduce plastic pollution, students began a recycling program within the school.

As we count down the last days of the 2023-24 school year at Claymont High School, it is a great time to reflect on our successes and memorable moments. Our exceptional students and staff have distinguished themselves in academics, extra-curricular activities, community service, and school citizenship. Here are some highlights from the past year:

ACADEMIC ACHIEVEMENTS:

- Over 80 students at CHS and BCC were named to the Principal's List at the end of the first semester for having a 4.0 GPA or higher.
- Over 35 seniors have received college/trade school scholarships.
- Our 2023 State Report Card showed improvement in every academic content and in the areas of Achievement, Progress, and College & Career readiness.
- 52 students are enrolled at Kent State Tuscarawas, Akron University, and Stark State College to earn college credit through the College Credit Plus program while completing their high school requirements.

CAREER TECHNICAL SUCCESS:

- Through a partnership with Junior Achievement, students in our CTE Business pathway created Age Well, a student-run business that challenges you to change your daily routine and embrace opportunities for growth and happiness as you age. They have been interviewed on numerous radio and television programs, presented at community meetings and events, and won a \$5000 prize in a business plan competition.
- Students in our CTE Agriculture pathway hone their agriculture knowledge and leadership skills through participation in FFA. This year 14 students attended the FFA State Convention and the following awards: Ohio FFA Scholarship, 4th place Diversified Agricultural Production Proficiency Award, Gold Rated Secretary's Book, Gold Rated Treasurer's Book, Gold Rated Reporter's Book, 2nd place Plant Systems Agriscience Fair, and three State FFA Degrees.
- During the 2023-24 school year the CTE Manufacturing Operations, Machine Tools, and Machining with Industrial Lathes classes attended a career field trip to Provia and Gradall. Students also produced many signs for local businesses and farms. Some of those include Decarlo Construction, Tony's Water Softeners, Roman R Farms, Jan Paul Farms, and several others. Students have also performed some welding services for Parts
- Next year we will begin a new Career tech pathway in Performing Arts. Stay tuned for more exciting news about this program!

EXTRACURRICULAR SUCCESS:

- This year's Esports program boasted over 22 active participants. We fielded seven teams over five games in our OSHAA-sponsored spring league with Esports Ohio, with over 67 schools involved. We competed in Fortnite, Overwatch, Super Smash Brothers Ultimate, Mario Kart, and Valorant. At the end of the season, our Valorant team qualified for regionals at Ohio University, marking our second consecutive trip to regionals. In addition, one team member qualified for the All-Ohio team for Valorant due to his skills in the game throughout the year.
- For the first time in almost 20 years, our Claymont Mock Trial team qualified for state competition. Only 28 teams in the state made it to this level, and Claymont's team was the only one representing Tuscarawas County.





FINE & PERFORMING ARTS

- Our Drama Department wowed audiences with their performances of *The Little Mermaid* in April and *The Trial of the Wicked Witch* in November. Through their efforts, the entire performance space has been refreshed with new light and sound systems, control panels, curtains, stage floor, and supporting technology. If you have not attended a performance, you are missing out on some of the best talent in the county.
- Our Band and Choir numbers are growing each year and after a long hiatus, our students are once again attending competitions. CHS Band and Choir students participated in the OMEA Solo & Ensemble, where students performed for feedback from a judge, and some competed for a rating. Our singers and musicians earned five Superior ratings, and three Excellent ratings, and five students or groups performed for comments only. The Music Department is excited to continue the trend of excellence in performance in the years to come!
- The annual Fine Arts Festival, held at CHS in April, showcased the artwork and performances of students from across the district. It is one of our most attended events in the district and the talents of our students entertained and impressed those in attendance.
- CHS Art teacher, Carrie Kunkle was awarded the CORAS (Coalition of Rural and Appalachian Schools) Teacher of the Year award for distinguishing herself in the area of art education. Her students would tell you that this is a well-deserved honor!

SOCIAL-EMOTIONAL SUPPORTS:

- Claymont High School was awarded the PBIS (Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports) Bronze distinction. PBIS is a framework that guides school teams in the selection, integration, and implementation of evidence-based practices for improving academic, social, and behavioral outcomes for all students. All this means that we work hard to create a positive environment in our school!
- Each day, in our Canine Handling Program, approximately twenty-five students learn valuable interpersonal skills while partnering with our school's trained facility dog. Our Peers Uplifting Peers or PUP program is an ancillary service of this facility dog program. PUP is a student-led, midday respite for all high school learners, especially those who are experiencing stress or anxiety. Our program focuses on developing students' communication skills, teamwork, and stress management, and provides student leaders with field experience in our school. Our teen leaders are trained in trauma-informed care and many are Teen Mental Health First Aid ® certified. This training and their collaboration with our facility dog assist student leaders in helping peers who may be experiencing intense emotions, and our PUP room offers them a safe space to engage in encouraging communication, provide comfort, and teach healthy coping mechanisms that build resilience and strengthen relationships. Leaders and participants both develop a deeper understanding of compassion, empathy, and responsibility while creating a positive impact on the school community and beyond.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT:

- Thanks to the support of our entire Claymont Community, we provided everything needed for 34 children in our district to have a very special Christmas Day. Each child received at least two outfits, pajamas, underwear, socks, a coat, hat, gloves, shoes/boots, a blanket, their special wish gift, toys, and many other items. The families also received food, toiletry items, and household supplies that were collected by our Student Council.
- For an entire week, every CHS student spent one period per day working on a chosen community service project. They made dog pull toys and dog and cat treats for the animal shelter, made blankets for our Christmas kids, hand-crafted cards for patients at Akron Children's Hospital and residents of local nursing facilities, recorded books for storytime at the elementary schools, made ornaments to pass out to students in other district buildings, assembled bikes, and wrapped hundreds of gifts.

The 2023-2024 school year was a successful one at Claymont Middle School. There were so many positives that happened throughout the year. We would like to highlight a few of those and thank all of our students, staff, and families for a great year.

MUSTANG MANIA

CMS "kicks off" the school year with a great night we call "Mustang Mania." We use this night for the parents/students to see all that we have going on at CMS during the school year. It is a great night and we have a lot of greatly appreciated community support.

In addition to Mustang Mania to kick off the school year, CMS always has a "Leadership Conference" for our students on one of the first student days. CMS is a Leader in Me school. Founded on the belief that everyone has the potential to lead, Leader in Me is a comprehensive PK–12 framework that nurtures student leadership, fosters a culture of trust, and boosts academic success. The Leadership Conference introduces students to how CMS utilizes Leader in Me and how they can get involved at CMS.





Partnering with the above endeavors, students are learning valuable social emotional skills in the classroom. Mrs. Monticelli, our school counselor, uses in class guidance lessons to teach students grounding techniques, emotion regulation, relationship building, communication skills, and empathy. Local agencies (T4C, Compass, and Youth to Youth) invest in educating our students in social emotional learning, as well.

One area that we always strive to improve on is our scores on the Ohio State Report Card. Claymont Middle School received the "Momentum Award" this year for improvements made on the state report card. The Momentum Award is for a school who has improved their performance index by 3 or more points AND received a value-added rating of 4 or more stars.

Our students performed well in cocurricular activities such as Power of the Pen, Scripps National Spelling Bee, MathCounts, and Project Lead the Way. We had three students represent Claymont Middle School at the Power of the Pen State Tournament. Power of the Pen is a competitive writing competition. Students are given prompts and are scored based on their writing. Our three students are pictured below: CMS also has students participate in the regional MathCounts competition and many of those same students represent CMS at the county math tournament at Buckeye Career Center. 8th grader Logan Cox will represent Claymont Middle School at the National Spelling Bee in the Washington DC area during the week of Memorial Day.

Project Lead The Way (PLTW) is an innovative project-based learning program that incorporates science, technology, engineering, and math. This school year was a very busy year. There are many things to celebrate. 25 Claymont High School students will have completed an approved pre-apprenticeship. 7 CHS students have completed an internship in a career setting that required 130 hours or more. Juniors and Seniors visited the College and Career Fair hosted at the KSU PAC center as well as juniors were given the opportunity to attend the college fair at Muskingum University this spring. The high school had the first ever job shadow/college visit day for students to participate in during e-learning week. The freshman class visited the Junior Achievement Inspire event at the Pro Football Hall of Fame for the first time. The first and second grade classes participated in Junior Achievement learning activities led by our own CHS business students. Fourth and Fifth grade classes participated in JA in a day activities led by community volunteers and the Business age-well group. High School students participated in career tours at ProVia, Gradall, and Allied Machine & Engineering. The high school PLTW students took part in a tour of the KSU Tusc Campus & Engineering department and learned about the engineering program opportunities at KSU. The middle school PLTW class took part in an engineering career day at Allied Machine & Engineering. They also participated in a visit with KSU Engineering Program director Paul Dykshoorn, and took part in an engineering activity during the visit. Numerous businesses visited our classes at the high school and middle school this year to learn about careers and potential employment opportunities.



The Career and Technical Education programs made major strides this year. We hosted the first ever Business Advisory Council (BAC) meeting at the high school. The BAC meeting included dinner, a keynote presentation by John Kelly from the Tuscarawas County Economic Development Company, and break out sessions for each program to work with their own council. There were many cross-curricular activities that occurred this year between the High School CTE programs and the other schools in our district. Mr. Schilling's Career Connections class had a visit from each CTE program instructor this past fall, to learn more about the CTE programs at the high school. The High School hosted a career tech guest speaker panel in the Career Connections class that included high school students that represented each CTE program. High school students shared about their experience in the program, and showed off the work they have done while in the Career Tech program. The Agriculture class visited the elementary school to conduct lessons with the first and second grade students for National Ag Day. The Business students provided JA lessons at the Elementary school and Intermediate school to help students learn more about business operations. The manufacturing program supported the efforts of building an outdoor classroom at the elementary school by building the benches for the outdoor classroom.

There are many positive strides being taken within the district to help improve students' educational experience. Mrs. Haney and Mrs. Marsh have been working on a grant with Inventionland to make improvements on the library at the Intermediate school. These upgrades will provide both the students and staff a better environment for learning within the Intermediate building. Mr. Wright, Mrs. Haney, Mrs. Burns, and Mrs. Cook worked together to write the Grow OH grant. The Grow OH grant will be an initiative in the school district to provide outdoor classrooms, STEM learning opportunities, and cross curricular opportunities in all 3 buildings. We will aim to include the Intermediate and Middle schools next year. Career Advising sessions were held with all 8th grade students this year. The goal of the career advising sessions was to provide the students with a deeper understanding of opportunities at the high school, as well as provide 8th grade students with tools to research their career cluster pathways determined by the OMJ career interest survey. Career Counseling sessions were also provided for the sophomore, junior, and senior students to help guide planning for the next 1-2 years of high school and beyond. Career resources were provided, as well as career learning opportunities were presented in those sessions. There are many things to celebrate this year. TRANSPORTATION CHANGES

The following changes will be implemented for the 2024-2025 school year.

- The Claymont Board of Education has extended the student walk-zone to one mile.
- Students are permitted only one (1) stop. For example, a student will not be dropped off at one location on M-W-F and another location on T-TH. Students must be picked up/dropped off at their original location.
- The following stops have been eliminated from our routes:
 - 5th & Logan St. Dennison (Bus 1-23)
 - Fuhr & 3rd St. Dennison (Bus 1-23)
 - First & Wilson St. Dennison (Bus 1-23 and Bus 3-24)
 - Deersville Ave. & E. High St. Uhrichsville (Bus 1-22)
 - Nazarene Church Bus Stop Uhrichsville (Bus 1-22)
 - 10th & Water St. Uhrichsville (Bus 1-15)



• If your child needs to ride home with another student because of extenuating circumstances, parents will need to fill out the bus rider form and send it to your child's office. The building principal will verify the form and notify the transportation department. Students will not ride a bus without prior permission from school administration.
